ONE LAST ROUND

It goes without saying that Rachel and I are looking forward to the privilege of living in the Land of Israel, as well as being reunited with our children and grandchildren, when we make Aliyah a year from now. At the same time, it won't be easy leaving a community we truly love and concluding the work to which we have devoted our lives. As the English bard reminds us: parting is such sweet sorrow.

Through this past spring, I was able to reassure myself that there would still be another lap around the track. At the conclusion of each of 5781's fall, winter, and spring holidays, I could take comfort in knowing there would still be one more I could share with Congregation Sons of Israel -- there would be another Chanukah, Purim, Pesach, and Shavuot. It was only a month-and-a-half ago, with the advent of Tishah b'Av, that I realized that from here on in, each holiday, fall literature series, and Hebrew School promotion would, for me, be the last.

It's like a child's experience of a merry-go-round. First, you stand in line, awaiting your turn in what seems forever. Then, the previous riders leave their mounts and make their ways to the exit. At last, you choose your steed and the attendant buckles you in. The carousel starts with a jolt. For a moment, it takes your breath away. But then, your mouth curls into a smile as the platform whirls around and around. You catch sight of your parents among the spectators waving to the children; and you wave back, repeating the exercise every ten seconds or so. Around and around you go. It feels like this will last an eternity. And then, the attendant cuts the engine. The platform begins to slow. Suddenly, you realize you are completing the last rotation. You focus. You study the crowd of spectators, smiling still; then notice other children standing in line, just as you did. As long as you can, you hold onto that moment. The attendant approaches. He unbuckles your belt. You dismount and head for the exit. It is someone else's turn. Was it a dream?

Right now, I am focused on the final round. As Spenser and Shakespeare would say, it might be the last, but not least. Actually, I prefer the way our own sages would put it: "Acharon acharon chaviv" (Bereishit Rabbah 78:8) – "The last is the most precious of all."

Rachel joins me in wishing you a sweet, healthy, happy and precious New Year! May we all make the most of it.

Can you hear the sound of my voice or are you reading the CSOI Bulletin?

In either case, you identify with CSOI. I will assume that we have met over the past year, but I will not presume that we know each other well. Therefore, I think it is only appropriate that I formally introduce myself.

Several months ago, I watched a TED Talk speaker instruct the seated audience that the best way to introduce oneself is not by talking about what you do, but rather by talking about who you are.

So, I'm going to take some liberty and share with you some factors that have influenced my value system.

I was born in East New York, Brooklyn. I lived with my sister and parents on the first floor of a two-family home. My mother's parents, Grandma Jennie and Grandpa David lived upstairs. My Grandpa David was a Cossack in the Russian cavalry. He fled from Minsk with Grandma to America after the Russian-Japanese War in 1905. He was a tailor in America and I remember playing on his old sewing machine that had a foot pedal to spin the bobbin of thread. Even as a toddler, I was always fascinated by the skill of his hands. And, I remember the look of pride in his face as he completed a difficult piece of tailoring.

Although we were not observant Jews, every Friday night, Grandma Jennie made dinner for the entire family as we dined together in the crowded upstairs kitchen. On some holidays, we would light candles, say a blessing, eat challah, drink wine, and talk.

Before I attended school, Grandma would take me shopping to Dumont Avenue, Blake Avenue, and Pitkin Avenue where I was greeted by the local merchants with treats as I gazed at the pushcarts, live poultry, and sawdust on the butcher floors. When I was 8 years old, my grandparents died one month apart. I missed them greatly.

My father's mother, Grandma Bessie lived in Red Bank, New Jersey. Grandpa Julius died at age fifty before I was born. My father was 14 and he quit school and went to work as did his older brother and three sisters. Grandma Bessie lived with two of her daughters and received a regular weekly stipend from her children to pay the rent. Although, she lived two hours away, we visited her every month until she died.

As a young boy, I had everything I needed. In reality, my family was very poor. After my grandparents died, we couldn't afford the mortgage, so we sold the house and moved into public housing called the Pink Houses. I was a latch-key child who walked to school, made my own breakfast, prepared my own lunch bag, and came home to get snacks and to do my homework. As I got older, I consulted with my mom on how to prepare the evening meal. My mother was the first mom I knew that went to work. She was a receptionist for the Domino Sugar Co. My father was a linotype operator/printer six days a week leaving at six am and returning twelve hours later. The combined salary of my parents was \$30 a week. I thought we were rich!

Although we never attended Shabbat services, my parents found money in their budget for me to register at a local orthodox synagogue where I attended Hebrew school from grade 4 until my

Bar Mitzvah. I had the good fortune to re-connect with Rabbi German ten years ago and we reminisced about the old days.

OK, so what's the point of this narrative? What are the takeaways from my early childhood that influenced not only what I chose to do, but equally important, who I am and my value system? Ask yourself the same question. Why are you still connected to CSOI?

Perhaps, you understand and appreciate –

Spending time with your family. Not just your immediate family, but the global family that we call the CSOI "community".

Spending time celebrating tradition. Not just your family rituals, but the identification with Jews throughout the world who are celebrating the same traditions.

The pride in working hard to get the job done. Not just a reaction, but a consequence of your actions.

Knowing that health and happiness is not defined by monetary wealth. Rather, we possess good fortune by accumulating moral, ethical, and spiritual wealth.

A balance in your life - we are not just passing time but allocating time to matters of importance.

In the coming months, we will continue to face a barrage of ordeals and tribulations. As the President of CSOI, it will be my mission to provide you a safe haven where you can reflect on your value system, find joy and self-worth.

I invite you to join us for Shabbat services, for morning Shacharit services, for the High Holidays of Rosh Hashanah, Kol Nidre, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah. And, please be sure to support CSOI by completing the Yizkor Pledge that has been mailed to your home.

In closing, use your connection to CSOI to make this a year of good health, happiness, peace, and prosperity.

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The Youth Savings Account is available to children and teenagers ages 6 through 17. Accountholders must be able to write their name and provide one form of identification, such as a birth certificate or school photo ID. There is a \$5.00 minimum deposit to open and earn interest for the Youth account. *Annual Percentage Yield (APY) is effective as of August 3, 2021 at the following tiers: \$5.00-\$10,000: 2.96% interest rate and 3.00% APY; \$10,001-\$20,000: 0.75% interest rate and 3.00% - 1.87% APY (There is no limit on account balance; the \$20,000 balance is used for annual percentage yield computation purposes only.) The APY may be changed by the Bank at any time, including after account opening. A limit of one Youth Savings Account applies per child. Offer may be withdrawn at any time without prior notice. Accountholders ages 14 - 16 years of age are eligible to request an Apple Bank Visa® debit card for this account if the account is joint with a parent or guardian. Seventeen-year-old accountholders may request a debit card without a parent or guardian custodian.

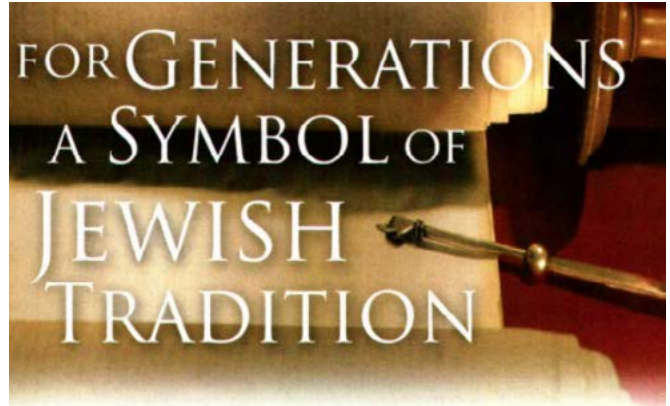
